
This track received a tremendous response with paper, workshop and panel discussion submissions from across Canada, the US and internationally.

#### **CCSBE 2021 HIGHLIGHTS**

Research shows that women entrepreneurs face barriers to engage in public procurement at the societal, organizational, and individual levels. This panel discussion provides a review of public procurement and supplier diversity initiatives in the Canadian context, the major roles of the supplier councils in Canada, (certification, training, and providing networking opportunities) and the lack of necessary capacity, complex bidding processes, critical resources, and women's inadequate information are considered to be the main barriers to women-owned SMEs' engagement in the public market.

### IMPORTANCE OF DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION FOR ENTREPRENEURIAL SUCCESS:

Best Practices in Entrepreneurial Education and Development for Women of Color The number of women-owned businesses has skyrocketed over the past 20 years. However, data sources also reveal significant disparities between the successes of minority vs. non-minority, women-led firms. There are also disparities among the women-led, minority-owned firms. Not all women entrepreneurs have access to the same set of tools, resources, education, networks, capital, or circumstances. This session provides insights into the unique challenges that many women entrepreneurs of colour face in starting and growing a business as well as a discussion of best practices for creating the entrepreneurship curricula and programs that address these issues

The Global Entrepreneurship Monitor (2019) asked national experts in 54 economies to assess the environment for entrepreneurship in terms of 12 conditions. Entrepreneurship education was universally ranked as the weakest condition.

A panel of global experts showcased strategies to strengthen the relevance and inclusion of entrepreneurship education and training. Participants also learned about tools to assess program design, content and delivery. The topic is of particular interest to instructors, trainers and program managers of accelerators, incubators, E-Hubs and entrepreneurship centres.

Partnering with Higher Education Institutions to Drive Recovery & Resilience

When COVID-19 struck, the City of Toronto and the 8 Toronto higher education institutions (HEIs) mobilized to support response and recovery efforts and to imagine a city where the economy and all parts of the community could thrive, engaging faculty and students to help develop capacity for the City of Toronto and GTA businesses and community. A partnership model was designed sourcing faculty and student experts to work with City staff to address urgent local needs as part of the consortium.

The panel outlines Toronto's collaborative innovation approach, 8 pilot projects, issues and challenges that arose, how these were addressed, how City staff embraced an innovation and entrepreneurial mindset - and plans for this model, now a permanent fixture of the City of Toronto, to operate at a scale across Ontario for municipalities and area businesses.
